


Very poignant - A late poppy in flower in St John's churchyard on Remembrance Day.

## **Crosses and Poppies for Remembrance**

In November, we continued a tradition established by Kingfisher before Covid: we erect wooden crosses outside The Mead and Castle Mead Primary Schools, wrapped around with crocheted poppies, as a symbol of remembrance and a reminder of God's presence even in conflict.

When we offered to put these crosses up for the schools again this year, we received instant responses of "yes please" from the two headteachers.





In December, we are taking our Living Nativity presentation into the schools again (year 1 and year 4): please pray that children and staff will engage with the message of Jesus coming to earth as a baby, destined to become our saviour and king.

## **Church Weekend 2025**

As I write this, many of us have just got back from the 2025 edition of our St Thomas' Church Weekend, which this year took place at Hill House. This Christian conference centre is perched on a hill just to the west of Bridgewater, close to the estuary of the River Parrett and the wetlands of Steart Point.

A total of about 50 adults and 13 children and young people attended the weekend, plus two day visitors on the Saturday. We were also blessed to be joined by three students from Falmouth who led the children's and young people's work throughout the weekend, freeing up our own adults to take part in the sessions.

It was great to have Simon leading our sessions through the weekend, which focussed on four different themes. Each session started with worship, then had a video to get us thinking, and went on to explore the theme with the help of a bible passage. There was a progression to the themes: firstly we looked at Psalm 100 and giving thanks to God; then we looked at Ezekiel 37 and how God can release and transform (Simon shared some of his own story and how God's power has been at work); then we looked at Romans 12 and what God wants us to do with our transformed lives; and finally we looked at Acts 2 and the Spirit empowering us to witness (tying up with the final part of our recent study series on Spiritual Gifts).

That wasn't all though. We had an interesting Q&A session discussing questions about faith that people had raised; a short act of Morning Prayer was available at the start of each morning and Compline each evening; and we shared in a final act of worship together in the family communion after coffee on Sunday morning.

Of course, a weekend away like this is not just about the formal sessions. Eating was an important part of the weekend too, and I have to say we ate really well! One of the challenges of using Hill House was that we had to do everything for ourselves, including catering. But our amazing planning team nailed it as far as the food was concerned!

Various people planned, shopped and led each meal, and then the

guests signed up to be on kitchen/serving team for one or more meals. That spread the workload, and gave us all a chance to contribute without anyone having to miss sessions.

Another important part of weekends like this is the social element. The simple fact of spending time together, and chatting over meals or drinks, helped us to get to know one another better. I hope that those who were relatively new to the church came away with a stronger sense of being part of a family. There were opportunities on Saturday afternoon for people to do activities or go for walks together. It's also become something of a tradition at church weekends to have an entertainments evening, and Saturday night did not disappoint! Geoff and Laura did a great job of hosting the 'concert', and we had a wide range of entertaining, beautiful, or sometimes hilariously funny acts. I won't try to describe them - you had to be there!

So what were my own personal impressions of the weekend? I thought it was a great success. I appreciated the ground that Simon covered in the sessions, which was encouraging and challenging in a gentle sort of way. It was brave of Simon to take on being the 'speaker' at such a weekend only 6 months into his ministry with us, but it worked really well. It gave us the opportunity to find out more about Simon and Elle, and gave Simon the opportunity to encourage us with the things that he believes are important as we seek to worship and serve God together. It was good, too, that there was space in the sessions to discuss and to pray with and for each other. Prayer also spilled out beyond the meeting room, and even into the car park, which was encouraging to see. And of course, I enjoyed the food and the social side of the weekend too!

As a church we want to say a big 'thank you' to those whose hard work made the weekend possible: Simon, with Elle's support, for leading the weekend; John for chairing the team that did the organising; the members of that team, dealing with bookings, finance, catering, transport, facilities, youth and children's provision and so on; Tamar, Lilja and Laurie for leading the youth and children's work; those involved in worship and tech stuff; the people who led meal teams; and of course everyone who participated and helped out in any way.





## **Ugandaid**

I have the privilege of being part of the team going to Uganda with the charity Ugandaid next year from February 16th until March 4th. Ugandaid is one of the Overseas Missions supported by St Thomas' and Pauline B and I have been involved in their work since 2012. We have each taken part in 4 visits and been involved in various projects. Ugandaid was set up just over 20 years ago to provide sponsorship for young people to attend Nile Vocational Institute (NVI) in Jinja. The young people are chosen from the poorest of the poor to undertake 2 or 3 year courses and gain well respected qualifications in a variety of practical subjects including Nursery Nursing, Hotel and Catering, Electrical Engineering and Motor Mechanics. So far at least 800 young people have graduated through Ugandaid sponsorship and this has provided them with an opportunity to find a good job and find a way out of extreme poverty. The ripples from these young people are often far reaching as when the young people have good jobs they are able to help support their families and often take on the sponsorship of others that need help, one even set up an orphanage!

During our trip in February we will mostly be based at NVI taking on a practical project and spending time with the students. I hope to meet Pius who is currently being sponsored by our lovely Church family. I also hope to meet up with our first student Mary F who is now married with a baby and lives locally.

The practical project we are hoping to do is refurbishment of the girls dormitory to make it a nicer place for the students to live. The team have worked their way around much of the NVI 17 acre site and would now like to start making a difference in the girls' dormitories. We hope that some of the students will help us so we can spend time with many of the Ugandaid students. We don't have any photos of the interior of the rooms but this is the building which currently houses around 420 girls. The intention is to renovate one, or possibly two of the smaller rooms, each with two quintuple bunk beds.

The accommodation is basic, but for many it is an improvement from home.

It would be great to brighten up the accommodation for at least some of the girls. Hopefully, this would mobilise the college to start a broader project.



As well as sponsoring students, currently 100 young people, Ugandaid also endeavour to support them through their training with personal equipment. The team will meet up with all the students, including the new intake, likely to be around 20 and we give each of the new students a gift bag

of some of life's essentials and simple gifts, like toothpaste, toothbrush, note book, pen. This maybe the first gift they've ever received and it's a real joy to see their beautiful glowing smiles. We are very grateful to our Seeker leaders and young people who held a car wash and raised over £250. This money will be put towards the

gift bags. We would love to raise some a bit more money which will be spent on mosquito nets, mattresses and other essentials.

So we plan to hold a second Games Evening and light supper on January 17th and invite our Messy Church families. Last



time several families came and had a great time. We plan to have games for under 5s right up to adults. We would love it if lots of people of all ages could come along, play games and spend time with some families who may not have had much contact with Church. It was especially lovely that quite a few young people came along who were "adopted" by some of our Messy Church children, especially my grandchildren!

We realize games are not everyone's idea of fun so we will hold a cake sale after Church on Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> as lots of people have very kindly

asked how they can contribute. Thank you so much for all the ongoing support for this work, it means such a lot.

So please save these dates and look out for more details and how to book nearer the time.

# Trip to Ushuaia, Robert J

As many at St Thomas' know I went on a mission trip to Bolivia in 2023. On that trip while chatting to a fellow team member, retired Bishop Maurice Sinclair, I heard about a mission he made to Ushuaia while serving in South America. Ushuaia is known as the "End of the World" because it is considered the southernmost city on Earth. It is in the far south of Argentina. Bishop Maurice told me about his journey to Spanish Harbour to visit a cave which was the resting place of Allen Gardiner, a missionary in the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century, my heart got very excited. Later, I read a little on Gardiner from the Church Mission Society (CMS) website which further intrigued me.

Then we had a visit from Azaria and David, the two CMS missionaries that we support in Guatemala, Central America, they had gone to a conference in Ushuaia where they got engaged. As each of them, separately, spoke about Ushuaia, my heart got really excited again.

After that I visited the CMS offices in Oxford England, spoke to Paul Tester, (who I had met first in Bolivia at a conference) he spoke at St Thomas' for CMS last year and is their manager for Latin America. He gave me a book about the missionary Allen Gardiner's life called "Unquenchable Fire" which I loved. I thought to myself this is a long way to go just for an excited heart, so I thought I will wait because CMS may have a trip there in the future.

Ushuaia was simmering in my heart, then David Goldstone's grandson visited the church and started saying that he wanted to go to Antarctica. Ushuaia is the place where the cruise ships leave for there, my heart jumped again. I had to take some action. The next week I was visiting Bath and enquired about a trip to Ushuaia at a travel agents, they gave me a good ticket price, so I bought the ticket there and then. I have 3 days in Buenos Aires, the capital of Argentina, then take a domestic flight down to Ushuaia for 9 days. I leave on the 6<sup>th</sup> of January next year.

I have been in contact with Pastor Javier Campero from Gran Rey Iglesia in Ushuaia, who has been very welcoming. He has advised me with some accommodation and is happy to have me visit his church.

At the moment I feel God wants me to go to Ushuaia, do some praying and spend time with church members and soak up the atmosphere. I have also spoken to a minister in Buenos Aires who has helped me with accommodation. I am just completing a beginner's Spanish course at Trowbridge College. I would welcome your prayers.
