



September – New Beginnings

I am always intrigued by the church calendar which has a swathe of 'ordinary time' – for something like half of the year. The liturgical colour for this ordinary time is green. We are somewhere in the middle of that now. It reminds me that most of what we are called to do as Christians is live out our faith in the ordinary. Our everyday faith lived out is so important, that half of the year is dedicated to it.

So, as you begin something new, or step back into the ordinary rhythm of life after the summer, remember that God is *always* with you. Step boldly yet lightly, remembering you are never alone. Your everyday life

is important to God, so don't forget to dedicate whatever you do to Him. Learning, working, recreation, serving, living with God is all an act of worship that He is interested in.

These words from Proverbs 3:5-6 spring to mind;

Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding;

in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight.

As my mind might naturally race now to Advent and Christmas (of course, they are important too!), I am also reminded to live in the moment. The Greek word often used in the New Testament (86 times!) for specific moments is kairos. Kairos is about the quality or significance of the moment, rather than chronos, a clock measured duration. A reminder to live in the moment, with the people we meet, the things we have now, and what God reveals today. Even the ordinary is significant to God, and it should be for us too.

May you see Him in your everyday.

St John's Update

Here we are in the meteorological autumn (1st September). The astronomical autumn starts with the autumn equinox on 22 September. In any case, autumn has come early, trees and flowers struggled with the summer heat (as we all did) and lack of water, which made survival difficult. The early autumnal colour, an abundance of berries and shedding of leaves is their way to stay alive. St John's Harvest Festival is usually held late September/early October, the church is suitably decorated and a kind farmer allows us to cut some maize from his fields as decoration - well not this year - the harvest was six weeks early, it has been harvested and fields tilled. Just one instance of how the seasons are changing earlier than normal. The churchyard needed little grass cutting during August and even though we had no rain, the field brambles and ivy would attempt to encroach over the perimeter wall, so attention was given to keeping them at bay. White safety lines were repainted on all external steps. We unfortunately have had three of St John's "family" in hospital, so our prayers went out to them for a speedy recovery and to return home. We had two excellent services in August, (one by Revd. Ivor Hughes and one by Revd. Simon) both meaningful and uplifting. Things start to speed up from September, school returns from their summer break; the church will be open for the Annual Wiltshire Historic Churches Ride and Stride Event - St Johns will be open from 10am to 5pm with stewards providing refreshment to all who visit; we have a PCC meeting; a christening; Harvest Festival (see separate article); then Remembrance Day, heading into Christingle and all the Christmas festivities, concert and carol service. Final details to follow. So August was the quiet before the storm. St John's next service will be: Service of the Word on 7th September with Holy Communion on 21st September. It would be wonderful to see you, a warm welcome awaits.

Happy Autumn - Autumn shows us the beauty in change; a time of harvest and perhaps a time to reflect on what we can release in our lives to make room for new growth. Our personal lives are like the seasons. It is up to us how we grow, how do we feed and nurture our faith. How do we harvest this amazing power of God and how do we share his word.

Mercy Ships

St Thomas' Church mission focus for September and October is Mercy Ships.

Mercy Ships is a global Christian Charity following Jesus's example of bringing hope and healing to those suffering from disability, disfigurement and disease. This is



achieved through the provision of hospital ships and partnering with African nations to help improve their healthcare and provide free surgery to those most in need.

Founded in 1978 by Don and Deyon Stephens, Mercy Ships has worked in more than 55 countries, providing services valued at more than £1.3 billion.

There are two hospital ships, the Africa Mercy and Global Mercy. The Mercy Ships crew of the Africa Mercy is led by a team of volunteers from up to 40 nations, all of whom give their time and expertise for free.

The Global Mercy has been in Sierra Leone undertaking surgery since August 2023, with the ship then in dry dock in Cadiz for its annual maintenance from 1st July to 3rd August this year. The Global Mercy is now back in Sierra Leone and will restart surgeries in the coming weeks.

The Africa Mercy is in Madagascar until the end of the year. Then she will have a maintenance period in South Africa for a few months at the beginning of 2026.

Among the countries Mercy Ships serves, which lies on the lower third of the World Health Organisation's Human Development Index, access to safe, affordable and timely surgery is extremely limited. As a result, countless people suffer and die from "diseases of poverty" that can easily be cured.

One of those benefiting from medical care is Selina.

Selina was born with a painful umbilical hernia, a condition that occurs when part of the intestine sticks out through the muscles near the belly button.

It kept growing every day. When she started walking, her mum took her to a hospital. Sadly, the hospital said she was too young for surgery. With no hope of treatment in sight, Selina continued to grow up with the hernia.

Hidden under her t-shirt, Selina's hernia had grown to a large 6cm lump. Hernia pains for adults can be devastating, and the same was true for two-year-old Selina.

Mariama fought to give Selina a happy childhood. But it was a struggle, because every time they left the house, Mariama was afraid of what people would say about her daughter. "Most times, I used a bandage to cover the hernia when she went out, to stop people from mocking us," said Mariama. Despite her efforts, she continued to hear harsh comments from people around them.

Dr John Zwiacher, the Volunteer Surgeon who later operated on the toddler on board the *Global Mercy*, added that it's common for children with umbilical hernias to face social stigma.

Thankfully, Selina was given free surgery on board the *Global Mercy*. With the risks of an untreated hernia out of the way, her mum could look forward to a healthier and safer future for Selina.

As well as completing thousands of urgent operations in every country we visit, Mercy Ships also works closely with host nations to improve the way healthcare is delivered across the country, by training and mentoring local medical staff, and renovating hospitals and clinics.

Kadugli Newsletter and Prayer Diary

"Please do not grow tired of praying for Sudan" (Archbishop Ezekiel)

Recent News on Sudan.

News from Sudan is mostly general rather than specific, but it seems the SAF is advancing towards the west of the country, but still fiercely resisted by the RSF. As the SAF controls more ground, refugees have begun to return home, to places such as Khartoum, Al Jazira and White Nile in the East of Sudan. It is estimated that over 1.5 million of these have returned from other parts of Sudan, and another half million from abroad. Where fighting continues, however, people continue to flee their homes, bringing down the overall figure.

There is other encouraging news. UNICEF report that a humanitarian aid convoy has reached Dilling in South Kordofan province, This marks the first substantial delivery to this area by any UN agency since October 2024, and the convoy now will proceed to the provincial capital Kadugli. UNICEF reports that "The supplies are expected to benefit about 120,000 where humanitarian needs have reached catastrophic levels and communities have been under siege for months".

Encouraging though this is, we must remember future deliveries are not guaranteed, and that even what has been provided is only one delivery; many more will be needed. **The Church in Sudan.**

The church in Sudan has to live with the destruction of many of its buildings. A photo was posted on Facebook recently, showing the ruins of a church, and with the message "Here I came to Jesus and talked and cried My church is destroyed, but Christ will not be destroyed."

This is by no means an isolated instance. Many churches have been damaged or destroyed, and their members and clergy scattered. Talking about this recently, Archbishop Ezekiel cited his own family as an example, staying in three different places. He knew of families scattered even more widely, and some who had lost contact with each other. Separation was a form of trauma needing healing. He recognised that the church needed people skilled in dealing with these issues.

Archbishop Ezekiel has been able to bring support and encouragement by visiting and ministering to the church in different parts of the country, including Dongola in the Northern State, Khartoum and Omdurman, and also

the Nuba Mountains. He called for action to bring peace and unity, and prayed God would give the church the vision to handle the present crisis.

What about Kadugli Diocese?

News of the UNICEF humanitarian aid convoy is too fresh to be able to confirm it has reached Kadugli. When it arrives it will be welcome. It is expected to benefit 120,000 people, so much more is needed and regularly. Our own contributions are very important and are gratefully received, as are our prayers.

Accounts of specific acts of violence are few, but the worry and the danger is always present, as may be inferred from the prayer requests. Let us remember our suffering brothers and sisters also have families for whom they care. This comes through in messages from Archbishop Ezekiel and Bishop Hassan, and will be true for many others.



Conditions make it difficult for the church in Kadugli to witness, but it is evident the church continues to thrive amongst all the turmoil. There have been three confirmation services around the end of June/beginning of July,



each with over 100 candidates; photos are attached.

We continue to support the people of Kadugli in their search for desperately needed food and other essentials, and in addition, we have been supporting Hassan's son Yassa with help for his fees for his course at a university in Uganda. Our latest news is that he is doing well. For administrative and other reasons any money given for Hassan's son Yassa would need to be kept distinct from other funds, so anyone wishing to donate for Yassa can use the same payment details as for other funds for Kadugli, but with the reference "Yassa" instead of "Kadugli."

Across Bradford Deanery there has been a continuous warm and generous response to this need; thank you all. The church in Kadugli is intensely grateful for our support, both financial and in prayer. Please continue to give via your church if you can, or directly. The account details are:
